Dear Parents, Carers and Students

The term is now in full swing with the natural rhythm of Co-Curricular and information events now underway. Last week we welcomed Year 7 Parents and Carers into School for the PFA Welcome evening, the Year 12 information evening was held on Wednesday night and our first musical showcase evening was held last night.

The football, rugby and hockey seasons have started well as we head to another busy Saturday morning with fixtures against Scarisbrick Hall, Lymm HS and Bolton School.

It is also 'business as usual' with regard to curriculum trips. Last week, Year 13 Biologists enjoyed an excellent few days in North Wales where they had the opportunity to consolidate their ecology skills and complete work for the Required Practical Assessment component of their course.

This week we have celebrated European Day of Languages We were hugely impressed by Year 7's ingenious hat creations for our House Competition in celebration of different languages and cultures worldwide. Well done Year 7! Other events included a scavenger hunt and an MFL Bake Off. This week has also seen the return of the annual German Exchange. Since 2000, AGSB have enjoyed a long-standing relationship with Friedrich Schiller Gymnasium school and are currently hosting 29 students. AGSB students will travel to Germany for the '2nd leg' of the exchange on the 5<sup>th</sup> October. Many thanks to Mr Smith, Miss Farrelly and Mrs Farrell for all their hard work in making the exchange possible.

Developing leadership skills in students across all age groups is a key objective in our current strategy 'Developing Excellence'. This term, students in Years 8, 9, 10 and 12 can apply for three new student leadership roles: Mental Health Champions (Year 12), Anti Bullying Ambassadors (Years 8-10) and Wellbeing Ambassadors (Years 8-10). Interested students should apply via a letter of application (details can be found on Satchel One). Those shortlisted, will be trained by an external company and will play a key role in these important areas of our pastoral programme.

As I write, I am on my way to London with Ms Blaize and three Year 13 Biologists. Ibrahim, Freddie and Yuvan have taken a project on DNA origami to the next level and designed an application for transplant medicine through making transplant tissue universal. They have now been invited to the Francis Crick Institute by IRIS (The Institute for Research in Schools) where they have been shortlisted for 'Best Project in the UK.' I am delighted to announce that their project was 'highly recommended' by the panel of judges. We are extremely proud of their achievements.

Next Thursday (5th October) is an opportunity for Parents and Carers of pupils in Year 7 to come into school to learn more about our academic curriculum from Mrs Weil (Deputy Head - Academic).

The charity was set up by Collette's son, Jim Lynskey, who founded the charity after he was put on the waiting list for a heart transplant.


Save9Lives aims to spread the message that one organ donor can save or enhance nine lives. Jim very sadly passed away in 2019, but thanks to his family, his message

Dr Kathryn Weston is the founder of Tooled Up Education. She holds a Common and Civil Law degree (LL.B.) from Queen's University in Belfast and a Masters (MPhil.) and Doctorate (Criminology) from the University of Cambridge. She was an education and policy researcher for over ten years.

As a criminologist, Kathy specialised in resilience within institutional settings, social identity, identity in crisis and the role of narrative in coping. During her time as a criminologist and education researcher, she became interested in the

role of parenting for children's outcomes and the relationship between home and school.

Our students excelled in an Institute for Research in Schools (IRIS) project on DNA Origami.

A successful day at the Manchester Conference in June included presenting their research to just under 200 other pupils, teachers, and scientists. This was met with many compliments from the Director of IRIS and positive comments from University Professors. They also produced and displayed an academic poster.

Over the past few weeks, they engaged in

practical work in the classroom in their own time. DNA oligonucleotides, DNA scaffolds and other reagents were used to create a DNA structure to be analysed under an atomic force microscope by the Bragg Institute in Leeds.

We are delighted to say that on the back of all their hard work, they have been nominated for the Best Research Project Award by The Institute for Research in Schools and were awarded highly commended.

We had a great start to the Badminton season. Our U14B side are progressing well after a great fixture with Wirral Grammar School who hosted the team.




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### **Old Altrinchamians**
