HOUSE CRICKET

During March, the Hindu Sikh, and Jain Society (HSJS) launched AGSB's inaugural Indoor House Cricket Competition for the whole school. As a part of our society's values, the tournament was designed to bring the school community together as well as encouraging Student leadership being one of the first house competitions to be organised by a student body. The tournament ran in a knockout style format with the 4 houses competing for the crown.

The sixth form tournament was first up and in the Semi-Finals Bradbury Sixth form played Massey in what was a comfortable victory for Massey where they secured their place in the final after a clinical bowling performance as well as an outstanding show with the bat from Vishal Arun.

The second semi-final involved both Tatton and Stamford in what was a tight contest with Tatton managing to get over the line with only a few balls to spare. Consequently, an exciting final was set up for the upcoming week between Tatton and Massey.

The Final definitely didn't disappoint with Massey setting a massive 61 off just 7 overs thanks to some impressive hitting from Arthur Tazaki-Quayle, this therefore meant Tatton required 62 to win the tournament. Things started off well for Tatton getting 25 for the loss of only 1 wicket in 2 overs. The momentum they had then eventually carried them over the line with Naman Mudaliar taking his house across the line in the end.

The following week marked the start of the Year 11 & 10 competition which attracted a strong audience making for a fascinating 2 semi-finals.

The first match of the tournament was Stamford and Massey in what was an extremely dominant performance from Massey getting Stamford all out for 11 then proceeding to chase the score down in 4 balls taking them straight to the finals.

Second up was Tatton and Bradbury in what was another comfortable victory for the winning side as Bradbury set 37 after 5 overs and Tatton only managing to amass 28 off their allocated overs. Courtesy of an excellent bowling performance from Sheil Patel.

Once again, the final was set to be a great game with both teams dominating their semi-final matches and ready to take each other on. Massey won the toss and elected to bat first setting a strong 57 off their 6 overs with captain Dylan Parekh their highest scorer. Bradbury then went into bat requiring 58 off their 7 overs and with 2 overs left they required 21 to seal the game. The game as expected went to the last ball with Dominic Howard hitting the winning runs to seal the final for his house. In the end Bradbury edged out over Massey however with a balcony full of students and a last ball finish, cricket was the real winner.

FOOTBALL - Greater Manchester Cup Final


