YEAR 9 BARCELONA FOOTBALL TOUR

During the week before half term, the year 9 football team were granted the privilege to go on a football tour to Barcelona. We arrived late on the first night for dinner and an early night, which would be followed by training the next morning. Following a fun training session in the intense Spanish heat, we met in the afternoon for a few hours visit at the Camp Nou, where we had a chance to buy original FC Barcelona merchandise. Unfortunately, the stadium was under renovations, but we were still able to experience the Barcelona immersive tour, which proved to be very popular amongst the opinions of the boys. Dinner that evening was followed by a closely competitive Quiz Night, which was won by only two points. Tuesday was matchday 1, after some morning football on the beach, we prepared for our game in the late afternoon but due to a 40-minute delay from the opposition, we played a mixed A and B team game.



On Wednesday, we walked around the city centre of Barcelona with our tour guide, which included historical streets, gothic architecture, and political buildings; we also celebrated the birthdays of our two players, Ehsan and Eric. That evening was our real matchday 1, coming against the local Castelldefels FC. The small stature of most of their players meant their technical ability was immaculate, however, with the constant high press from Isaac, Daniyal and the midfield, along with the brick wall that stood as our defence, we would win in the second half comfortably, scoring 4 to round up a 6-2 win. It was an early game, scheduled for the early afternoon against the British School of Barcelona. Arriving at the same location as our A team game the previous night, the A team would play first as we came up against a tough midfield and a defence of comfortable passers. Despite starting strong, getting caught on the counter would be our demise. We would fight back, as we did in the first game, with the score fluctuating until the half ended 2-1 to BSB. The second half was one to watch, end-to-end, comebacks, penalties and disallowed goals made for a spectacular end to our tour. Towards the end of football, the Kho-Kho group stages began, with Trafford A

The B team had to beat everyone in their group to qualify which unfortunately they just fell short of, putting them one point off qualifying but still putting on an amazing performance considering the team was formed last minute with a bunch of new players.

Trafford A won each game in the group stages except for the game against Nottingham. Nottingham dominated in the first half putting us under great pressure. It was all down to the second innings. We did our best, made mistakes here and there under pressure, our vice put life and limb on the line dislocating his finger in the process and was no longer allowed to play. The refs finally announced that the game was tied on points putting us in contention for qualification. After 3 more games we came out on top of our group and moved on to the quarter finals.

Brian moved to Manchester in 1963 and joined the YMCA team and made great progress with hard work.

His coach Derek Schofield suggested that he returned to Scotland to compete in the National Championships which took him to the top level with great success.

He was the Scottish national team trainer and coach for five years and was the UKCC qualified coach and ETTA North West Coaching co-ordinator and then the ETTA regional coach.

He has coached table tennis at Altrincham Boys Grammar School for ten years with considerable success and is the Greater Manchester Schools team and individual organiser as well as enjoying playing plenty of golf to a good level.

His award for his services to his sport was the 'Table Tennis England Lifetime Achievement Award' which he was delighted to receive.

BADMINTON







During 2019/2020, the school had entered a KS3 badminton team to play in a North-west tournament at Manchester Grammar School. The team progressed in to the Semi-finals of that tournament where they had to play a strong MGS team. AGSB managed to win, and then went on to win the tournament. We were in to the next round, which was to be played at the velodrome. However, due to Covid-19, this didn't happen. This led to there being no badminton for a few years. However, badminton began to emerge again and in 2023/2024, the school manged to get an U14 A and B team, and an U16 A and B team.

Trials were held for each team, and soon enough the teams were sorted and ready to play. The first competition that took place was the Schools Sports Magazine tournament, a knockout tournament consisting of lots of schools from England.

Starting with the U14s, the B team managed to win in the 1st round and 2nd round, but they narrowly lost out to Grammar School at Leeds. The A team managed to reach the quarter-finals after winning their previous 4 matches. They faced King Egbert School and lost on point countback, to only just miss out on becoming Champions of the North.

The U16s also had great success in this tournament. The B team won their 1st round, and then beat MGS 4-2. They then beat Grammar School at Leeds. Unfortunately, the A and B teams were then drawn against each other, where the A team won. If the two teams weren't drawn against each other, the B team could have gotten further in the competition. The A team then progressed in to the quarter-finals, with previous wins against Wilmslow High School, Wirral Grammar School, and Penrith. The A team beat Tapton School to become Champions of the North. The next task was the Semi-final against Bedford School. Going in to the doubles the score was 2-2 with AGSB ahead on points. The match then ended 3-3 with AGSB winning on points. This was a very hard match for the team, so they did extremely well. We then travelled to Aylesbury, where we had to face Reading School. Unfortunately, they were too strong for us, but we did still did very well to reach a badminton national finals.

All 4 teams then entered the Badminton England schools tournament where the U16 A team and U14 A team won the county round and entered the regional finals. The regional finals was held in Bolton with both teams playing on the same day. The standard was high, but the resulting of winning would be advancing to the national finals. The U14s played very well, and beat both their opponents, securing a place in the national finals. The U16s had to fight very hard for the first match, as the team won 3-2 in the end. We then played another school beating them 5-0 to also head to the national finals. Therefore, both the U14s and U16s manged to reach the national finals, which will be played soon.

Overall, it's impressive to see such success in these recent tournaments for the U14s and U16s considering the circumstances with Covid-19. You've also got to remember that the people in these teams may have only played with each other just this year, so there's been a lot of good teamwork and communication between players. Therefore, a huge congratulations has to go to the players involved in the teams for doing as well as they have done. A huge thanks to Mr Rawson as well, who has spent a lot of time organising the fixtures and driving the various teams around the country.
